

HE Student Council is the most important organization in our school. Its purpose is to see that the wishes of the students are given consideration. Its membership is elected by the school and represents a cross-section of the student body. It not only works for the betterment of things for the students but helps the faculty to determine better school policies.

The president, Kenneth Stafford, was elected by the whole high school near the end of last year. He was assisted by Bobby Cruise, vice-president, also elected last year; Evelyn Hall, secretary; and Buddy Wirt, treasurer. The latter two were elected by the council.

The council sent representatives to a conference in Fredericksburg for the purpose of getting some better ideas for student government. The organization sponsored a drive to enlist the aid of all the school's clubs to purchase new warm-up jackets for the girls' basketball team. A March of Dimes campaign was also conducted by the council. A high goal of \$100 was exceeded by half. They gave a Thanksgiving donation to the Welfare Department. They again sponsored the annual "Farmer's Ball" and other dances.

The council felt a need for a new constitution and immediately set about devising a new framework for the use of future student councils.




LTHOUGH these "seniors elect" were busy preparing for the big year ahead they still found time for fun, thus earning the traditional title of "Jolly Juniors".

Football

The Pulaski High School Orioles, boasting one of the better teams in Southwest Virginia, completed its ten game schedule with a season record of five wins and five losses.

In their opening encounter, the Orioles handed the Dublin Dukes a 26-6 defeat. The team showed plenty of power and gave Coach J. Ward Long an idea of how the team would shape up.

With one win under their belts, the orangeand-black tangled with Christiansburg on the Calfee Park gridiron the following Friday night. Displaying most of their power in the first half, they racked up a 26 point lead by half-time. Buddy Ratcliffe boosted his scoring total to four touchdowns for the season by adding the first and final markers. The final tally was 32-6, giving the birds two district wins.

Taking to the road for the first time, the Orioles rolled over the Blacksburg Indians at Virginia Tech's Miles Stadium. After a Blacksburg score in the first quarter, the Pulaski boys, lead by two agressive backs, T. J. Duncan and Buddy Ratcliffe, roared back with four straight touchdowns to clinch the game, 24-14.

Unable to penetrate the superior line of the William Fleming Colonels, the Orioles were completely outclassed to the tune of 41-7. Joe Helvey seemed to be the only Pulaski back who could gain any ground. Dick Page displayed some excellent defensive play, several times dropping the Fleming ball carrier before he had reached the line of scrimmage.

The once-defeated Orioles came out on top in the statistics but not on the scoreboard when they lost a thriller to the Radford Bobcats. The Radford field was ankle-deep with mud, making footing slippery and uncertain. After the Orioles had scored 6 points in the first quarter, Radford came back in the fourth with a six-pointer plus the deciding extra point, leaving the Orioles on the short end of a 7-6 score.

The following Friday night, the Orioles came from behind to defeat the Narrows Green Wave 24-13 at Ragsdale Field. Although the orange-and-black got back into the win column, T. J. Duncan, shifty Oriole halfback, was lost for the remainder of the season due to a leg injury in the third quarter.

At Martinsville, the Pulaski eleven was riddled by a powerful attack which the birds could not match. The final score read 33-0.

After outplaying a scrappy Pearisburg team, the Orioles found the score deadlocked at 6-6. With only two minutes left to play, Coach Long, as a last resort, sent in Otis Quesenberry, who kicked a beautiful 30-yard field goal to give Pulaski a 9-6 edge.

The Orioles dropped what seemed a sure win to Galax the following week. The combination of Ferguson to Wirt clicked for the first touchdown, while Pat Surratt added another a little later on. But this I3-0 lead was surpassed by the Maroon Tide and finally melted into a 19-13 defeat for the Orioles.

Wytheville High School, boasting one of the best teams in their history, invaded Calfee Park to battle for the championship cup which is awarded to the winning team each year. At first, the struggle was nip-and-tuck, but after the first quarter, it was Wytheville all the way. Wytheville's excellent passing was largely responsible for the 29-0 tally which gave them the District Championship.

At the end of the '47 season a football banquet was given to the players by the Lions Club and awards were presented to the most outstanding players of the year by the local merchants. The banquet was thoroughly enjoyed by the players and afterwards the following awards were made: Buddy Ratcliffe, most points scored; Don Mabry, best down field blocker; Otis Quesenberry, field goal; French Ellis, best all-round linesman; and T. Basketball

As the basketball season rolled around, the school was looking forward to a better-than-average season on the hardwood. Four lettermen were back including Captain Jimmy Lowman, Mark Ferguson, Doug Williams, and Buddy Ratcliffe. Also up from the Junior Varsity were Vernon Boadwine, T. J. Duncan, Buddy Wirt, Doug Bratton, Dean Tester, and Raymond Swain. Particularly promising were Doug Divers, who transferred from a prep school, and Buddy Ratcliffe, whose ball-handling proved to be a valuable asset to the '47 team. From this galaxy of talent, Coach J. Ward Long was expected to have trouble in picking the best starting five.

The opening game was with the high school faculty, and the Orioles started the season with a bang as they swished the nets for 37 points while limiting their opponents to a close 35.

Holding the lead the entire game, the Orioles took a non-district game from Draper 30-16. Ferguson, flashy Oriole forward, showed up especially well by racking up 14 points.

Still unable to cope with Pulaski's fast moving quint, Draper High School went down again 41-16 in a return match at the Pulaski gym behind the marksmanship of Buddy Wirt's high scoring left hand that flipped in 11 points.

In their first district game, the Orioles were completely out-classed by the William Fleming Colonels of Roanoke, 55-29.

Bounding back from their first defeat, the orange-and-black took a 42-37 game from Narrows, staging a thrilling comeback. After a slow start, Bud Ratcliffe, shifty Oriole guard, sparked his team to the win by dropping in 16 points.

The Orioles suffered their second setback of the season at the hands of the Christiansburg Demons, 29-28 on the Montgomery County Court despite the vain efforts of Bud Ratcliffe and ''Peanut'' Boadwine, who scored 9 and 7 points respectively.

The following Friday, the Orioles lost a thriller to a fast Alumni team, composed of past high school students. The score read 36-31.

The Pulaski quint took an easy 49-22 victory from the Fries High School five, with a newcomer, Doug Divers, stripping the net for six field goals to take the scoring laurels for the night.

A last minute score by Mark Ferguson gave the Orioles a 27-26 edge over the Blacksburg Indians with Divers again leading the scoring, getting 13 points.

With three games on tap in one week, the birdmen took an easy 69-39 win from Wytheville with Captain Jimmy Lowman and Forward Mark Ferguson each garnering 13 points.

Radford took a 34-32 heartbreaker from Pulaski in the Oriole gym behind the sharpshooting of Sherman Davis, Radford forward. With the score tied 30-30 in the last three minutes, the Orioles were making a brilliant comeback. All hope was seemingly gone when Davis flipped in two straight baskets, putting Radford out front 34-30. Then Jimmy Lowman, in a vain attempt to save the game, dropped in one of his famous hook shots. But, time ran out, and the Valiant Orioles continued under the Radford jinx. Buddy Ratcliffe turned in his usual good game being high scorer with 14 points.

The following week against Pearisburg, the score was the same as with Radford, but Pulaski



Ably led by Vernon Boadwine, with thirteen points, the P.H.S. team took a scant victory from Fries High School on the Fries Court. The Orioles were in hot water all the way with Fries leading 20-15 at the half-time intermission. Then Divers, Ratcliffe, and Ferguson began clicking in the third quarter and the game was nip-and-tuck the rest of the way with Pulaski emerging the victor.

In chalking up their tenth victory, the Orioles, seeking revenge for their one point loss in the previous game with the Demons, were never headed by Christiansburg, and took an easy 39-27 victory. Ratcliffe took the scoring honors with 10 points, followed by Lowman and Boadwine with 7 points each.

The Orioles took a close 34-28 win from a scrappy Blacksburg five that staged an almost disastrous comeback. With the score 24-7 at the half, the Orioles settled back to an easy win, letting the reserves finish out the game. But when the final whistle blew, Blacksburg had nearly tied the score, despite Divers' 11 points.

Pulaski honorably bowed to William Fleming, 55-33, in a game marked by 49 fouls, of which Fleming made the necessary points to win, sinking 25 out of 38. Three Pulaski starters left the game on fouls, leaving a second string defense to the mercy of the fast Roanoke quint.

Pulaski had an off night, and lost to the Narrows Green Wave 36-33 at Narrows the following Friday night. Wirt and Ratcliffe stripped the nets for 9 points apiece, to copp scoring honors.

The Orioles dropped a lopsided game to Radford's Bobcats 56-34 at Radford, but were assured of a tournament bid despite the loss. The steel backboards and a good fast break accounted for the defeat although Ratcliff did get 9 points.

In their final game of the regular season, the Orioles trounced Pearisburg 56-39. Getting off to a fast start, Pulaski had jumped to a 14-0 lead by the first quarter. This had increased to 32-21 by the third quarter, T. J. Duncan and Vernon Boadwine, each a graduating senior, took scoring honors with 11 points apiece. They were followed closely by Buddy Wirt with 8 points and "Creep" Williams with 6 points.

Pulaski, as usual, hit one of the two best teams in the district in their first game of the class B district 6 basketball tournament held at the Virginia Tech gymnasium. The Orioles were up against the Martinsville Bulldogs, rated second only to William Fleming in district standing. Martinsville was hitting from all angles and Pulaski, somewhat confused by the Virginia Tech glass backboards, could not withstand the strong attack. Although "Peanut" Boadwine, lanky Oriole center, sunk 6 baskets from the floor and 7 at the foul line for a 19 point total, the tall, smooth quint from Henry County averaged 12 points per man to run up a 67-46 score. Boadwine was credited by many as playing the best game of any center in the tournament. Captain Jimmy Lowman also showed up well, scoring 10 points. Martinsville went all the way into the finals but dropped the deciding game to William Flemina 46-40.

Buddy Ratcliffe was high scorer for the year, having 157 points in 20 games, for an 8 points per game average. Mark Ferguson second in points with 111, followed by "Peanut" Boadwine with 105. Doug Divers was second in points-per-game average with better than 6 to his credit. Rounding out the first seven highest totals were Buddy Wirt having 97 points, Jimmy Lowman with 94, Doug Divers with 83, and T. J. Duncan with 81.

As a postscript to the season, we are happy to announce that Buddy Wirt, dependable forward, has been elected captain of next year's squad.

The Orioles hung up a season record of 12 wins and 8 losses for the '49 team to attempt to match, and, as the uniforms went to the mothballs, the school was rightly proud of its '48 team.






