# Lake Sonoma

Sonoma County  
California

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Lake Sonoma was formed when Dry Creek and Warm Springs Creek were impounded by the Army Corps of Engineers. Warm Springs Dam, about six miles south-southwest of Cloverdale, California, was completed in 1983 for flood control, water storage, and recreation.

The normal pool elevation is 451 feet above sea level, and at that level provides 2700 acres of surface for boating and fishing. The upper ends of Warm Springs Creek and Dry Creek were left uncleared of trees to provide fish habitat. Lake Sonoma is among the best bass fishing areas in California. Other game fish include Sacramento perch, redear sunfish, and channel catfish. Numerous campsites dot the shoreline.
